





## CARDINALS EXTREME HOME FIELD MAKEOVER

### CARDINALS STADIUM OPENS

Three years and four months have passed since the Cardinals officially broke ground on their new stadium, but who's counting?

Cardinals Stadium opens as the most innovative stadium ever built in North America.

The first stadium in North America to feature a retractable, natural grass playing field, Cardinals Stadium was named one of the 10 most impressive sports structures in the world by *Business Week*, before it ever hosted an event.

The Cardinals open the 2006 NFL preseason against the reigning Super Bowl champion Pittsburgh Steelers. Not only are the Cardinals showing off their new stadium, it will be the first chance fans have to see new Cardinal running back Edgerrin James.

### CARDS SELL OUT REGULAR SEASON

The Cardinals sold out of their 2006 season ticket allotment in early May following the NFL Draft, however fans did have an opportunity to purchase single game tickets.

On Saturday, July 22, remaining tickets for the Cardinals 10 home games went on sale to the public. By the end of the day, only four games, including one preseason contest, had not sold out.

A limited number of tickets remain for the 8/31 preseason game vs. Denver. All others are sold out.

### PLAYERS WOWED BY NEW HOME

Last Saturday, August 5 the Cardinals took the field at Cardinals Stadium for a dress rehearsal prior to this week's game. For many of the players it was their first look at the stadium. Others who had been in the stadium at various points during the construction still couldn't believe their eyes.

Here's what a few of them had to say:

**RB Marcel Shipp:** "This is crazy, I'm just amazed at how well everything came out. Every seat looks like a good seat. It just feels good to have a home now. You go in the lockerroom and you know you have a locker and it is yours for the season and we're not all cramped up."

**K Neil Rackers:** "It is beautiful. When I was here a couple of weeks ago I didn't see the field inside and it is just amazing. They have done a wonderful job with it and I'm going to be proud to play here. It is a first class facility. I was in Cincinnati when they opened up their new stadium and it can't touch this."

### KEY EVENTS OPEN NEW STADIUM

Major events mark the opening of Cardinals Stadium. Here's a look at what fan's can expect to see in Cardinals Stadium's inaugural season.

#### Saturday, August 12 - Stadium's Grand-Opening event

For this week's sold-out preseason game vs. the Super Bowl Champion Pittsburgh Steelers, several key local dignitaries will participate in pre-game ceremonies commemorating the building's opening.

At halftime, the franchise will honor the eight charter members of its Ring of Honor, seven of whom are also enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame. Those eight individuals are as follows (with Hall of Fame induction year in parentheses): owner **Charles W. Bidwill, Sr.** ('67); QB and coach **Jimmy Conzelman** ('64); HB/QB **John "Paddy" Driscoll** ('65); RB/DB **Marshall Goldberg**; DB **Dick "Night Train" Lane** ('74); RB **Ollie Matson** ('72); RB **Ernie Nevers** ('63); and HB/QB **Charley Trippi** ('68).

All fans in attendance will receive a commemorative Cardinals Stadium lanyard/ticketholder.

#### Sunday, September 10 – Regular season opener

For the team's week one opener against the San Francisco 49ers, fans will be treated to a special pre-game performance from Grammy-winning recording artists **The Black Eyed Peas**.

At halftime, Cardinals Hall of Fame safety and long-time administrator **Larry Wilson** will be placed on the team's Ring of Honor.

#### Monday, October 16 – Monday Night Football

The Cardinals will host the Chicago Bears in a prime-time Monday night match-up airing live nationally on ESPN. All fans will receive a Cardinals Red Cheer Towel and Hall of Fame offensive tackle **Dan Dierdorf** will be inducted into the team's Ring of Honor at halftime.

#### Sunday, November 12 – Veterans Day Celebration

When the Cardinals host the Dallas Cowboys on Veterans Day weekend, the team will pay tribute to the nation's military.

Hootie and the Blowfish lead singer **Darius Rucker** will perform the national anthem and Cardinals safety **Pat Tillman** will be honored in a special halftime ceremony when he will be placed on the team's Ring of Honor. That day, the team will also dedicate Pat Tillman Freedom Plaza that surrounds the stadium.

## CARDINALS & STEELERS - THE LAST TIME

### Last Meeting

**Steelers 28, Cardinals 15**  
**November 9, 2003 – Heinz Field - (59,520)**

Pittsburgh broke open a tight game with three touchdowns in the first 7:27 of the third quarter, then coasted in the Cardinals' first appearance at Pittsburgh since 1985. The outcome snapped Arizona's two-game winning streak and Pittsburgh's five-game losing skid.

The Steelers struck twice in the first 2:51 of the third quarter, beginning the second half with two short field possessions (Arizona's 27- and 22-yard lines) due to a short punt and fumble recovery, respectively. They converted with two touchdowns in three plays during a 67-second span, both passes from quarterback Tommy Maddox to wide receiver Hines Ward (five, 22 yards). Following the next two Cardinal possessions, Antwaan Randle El returned a Scott Player punt 52 yards for a touchdown, swelling Pittsburgh's 7-3 halftime lead into a commanding 28-3 advantage at 6:33 of the third quarter.

Arizona's two prize rookie wide receivers, Anquan Boldin and Bryant Johnson, tallied the Cards' two touchdowns on passes from quarterback Jeff Blake. Boldin's tally was an 11-yarder to cap a seven-play, 79-yard drive he highlighted with a 40-yard reception four plays prior to his touchdown. Johnson scored his first NFL touchdown on a 54-yard pass with only 17 seconds to play. Boldin caught eight passes for 118 yards, his second 100-yard effort in his ninth NFL outing. Running back Marcel Shipp gained 63 rushing yards on 22 carries, completing a three-game span of 86 totes, a modern-era Cardinal record. Blake posted his second 300-yard passing day as a Cardinal, completing 23-43 passes for 307 yards. His Steeler counterpart, Tommy Maddox, completed only 12 passes, but three were touchdowns.

## BOLDIN CLOSING IN ON 300

In his first three seasons with the Cardinals, Anquan Boldin has recorded 259 receptions, topping the 100-catch mark in two of those three seasons.

Boldin was the fastest player to reach 200 receptions, hitting the mark after only 34 games, two ahead of the previous record holder Lionel Taylor (Denver, 1961).

Taylor was also the fastest receiver to record 300 receptions, hitting the mark after 54 games.

Boldin averages 6.4 receptions per game. At that rate, he would hit the 300 mark in his 47<sup>th</sup> game (at Oakland on October 22). It would also make Boldin the fastest receiver to reach the milestone.

## CARDS ENTER YEAR THREE OF GREEN ERA

Now entering his third season with the Cardinals, head coach Dennis Green has revamped the team's roster and built a foundation for success.

Injuries ravaged the Cardinals in 2005 as the team placed a league-high 15 players on injured reserve. Of the 15 players placed on IR, at least seven figured to be full time starters.

Green, along with Vice President of Football Operations Rod Graves have worked together to land prize free agents Bertrand Berry, Kurt Warner, and Edgerrin James and draft stars such as Larry Fitzgerald, Antrel Rolle and Matt Leinart in the first round.

Under Green the Cardinals have become a much more competitive team. Since Green's arrival the team's margin of defeat has nearly halved while the margin of victory almost tripled.

## FITZGERALD LOOKING TO REPEAT '05

Larry Fitzgerald's 2005 season was one that receivers dream about.

The Cardinals 2004 first-round pick out of Pittsburgh was named to the Pro Bowl and set a new franchise record with 103 receptions for 1,409 yards and 10 TDs. The previous mark was set in 2003 by then rookie Anquan Boldin. Boldin also surpassed his previous team record while recording 102 receptions in 2005.

Fitzgerald tied Carolina's Steve Smith for the most receptions in the NFL in 2005.

The franchise record number of catches for Fitzgerald led him to his first career Pro Bowl in 2006. Fitzgerald accompanied Cards kicker Neil Rackers who set an NFL record with 40 field goals in 2005.

Along with Boldin, the receiving duo combined for 15 100-yard games in 2005, breaking the previous team record of 11 set in 2001.

Of Fitzgerald's 103 receptions, 27 of them came for 20-yards or more, ranking first in the NFL in 2005.

Now entering his third season with the Cardinals, Fitzgerald has never missed a start in 32 games.

## THE DYNAMIC DUO

In 2005 Boldin and Fitzgerald became only the second pair of teammates in NFL history to finish a season with more than 100 receptions and 1,400 yards.

Only two other sets of teammates have finished a season with more than 100 receptions.

The two also finished 2005 with a combined 2,811 receiving yards, the most by any tandem in the NFL. Cincinnati's Chad Johnson and T.J. Houshmandzadah finished second with 2,388 while Indy's Reggie Wayne and Marvin Harrison finished third with 2,201 yards.

Additionally, the pair finished 2005 with the most combined 100-yard receiving games in the NFL with 15. Boldin contributed eight while Fitzgerald added seven. The pair recorded 100-yard games in four of the same games in 2005.

## CARDS-STEELERS CONNECTIONS

Cardinals quarterbacks coach **Mike Kruczek** was drafted by the Pittsburgh Steelers in the second round of the 1976 NFL Draft and won two Super Bowls in his days there (1978 and 1979). When he stepped in to replace an injured Terry Bradshaw during his rookie year, his six consecutive wins were an NFL record that stood until current Steelers quarterback **Ben Roethlisberger** broke the record in 2004.

Cardinals tackle **Oliver Ross** played for the Steelers from 2000-2004 where he was an integral part of one of the leagues best running attacks. Ross started in 35 of the 64 games that he played for the Steelers, including all 16 contests in the 2004 season.

Defensive tackle **Kendrick Clancy**, one of the Cardinals key 2006 free agent pick-ups, was originally the Steelers 3rd round pick (72nd overall) in the 2000 NFL Draft. Clancy played in 53 games for the Steelers from 2000-2004.

Cardinals receivers **Larry Fitzgerald** (2002-2003) and **Greg Lee** (2003-2005) and linebacker **Gerald Hayes** (1999-2002) all attended college at the University of Pittsburgh.

The Cardinals will induct Marshall Goldberg into their Ring of Honor this week vs. Pittsburgh. At the University of Pittsburgh, Goldberg was a two-time All-American and an original member of the Cardinals "Dream Backfield."

Pittsburgh offensive tackle **Marvel Smith** played his college ball at Arizona State University from 1997-1999, where he was an All-American first-team selection by the Football News in 1999.

Steelers offensive guard **Grayling Love** also played college football at Arizona State University, attending school there from 2002-2005.

Cardinals receiver **LeRon McCoy**, corner **Robert Tate** and Steelers center **Tim Brown** both hail from Harrisburg, PA, which is also the hometown of Cardinals head coach **Dennis Green**.

**Kyle Schmitt**, a center for the Arizona Cardinals, grew up approximately 38 miles from Pittsburgh, in the small town of Derry, PA.

Cardinals free safety **Robert Griffith** and Pittsburgh wide receiver **Quincy Morgan** were teammates with the Cleveland Browns in 2002, 2003 and part of the 2004 season.

Cardinals wide receiver **Anquan Boldin**, defensive tackle **Darnell Dockett** and Steelers cornerback **Bryant McFadden** all attended school together at Florida State University from 2000-2002.

Cardinals rookie quarterback **Matt Leinart** and Pittsburgh Pro Bowl safety **Troy Polamalu** attended school together at the University of Southern California from 2001-2002.

## CARDS TO INDUCT EIGHT IN RING OF HONOR

In the first game at Cardinals Stadium the team will honor their history by inducting eight people into the new Cardinals Ring of Honor.

Of the eight, seven have already been inducted in the Pro Football Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio.

Here's a brief look at each individual that will be honored this weekend.

**Charley Trippi** - 1947-1955 Chicago Cardinals  
Hall of Fame, 1968  
Halfback/Quarterback, Georgia  
Gained nearly 10,000 yards and accounted for 53 touchdowns during Cardinal career.

**Ollie Matson** - 1952, 1954-1958 Chicago Cardinals  
Hall of Fame, 1972  
Halfback, San Francisco  
Rushed for 3,331 yards and 24 touchdowns, caught 130 passes for 2,150 yards and 24 touchdowns ... added nine touchdowns on kick returns.

**Dick (Night Train) Lane** - 1954-1959 Chicago Cardinals  
Hall of Fame, 1974  
Cornerback, Scottsbluff-NE Junior College  
Named to seven Pro Bowls ... set the NFL interception record (14) as a rookie.

**Ernie Nevers** - 1929-1931 Chicago Cardinals  
Hall of Fame, 1963  
Fullback, Stanford  
Scored record 40 points (six touchdowns, four conversions) in one game against Bears on Thanksgiving Day, 1929.

**Jimmy Conzelman** - 1946-48 Chicago Cardinals  
Hall of Fame, 1964  
QB, Coach-Owner, Washington University-St. Louis  
Coached Cardinals to 1947 NFL Championship, 1948 Western Division crown.

**John (Paddy) Driscoll** - 1920-25 Chicago Cardinals  
Hall of Fame, 1965  
Quarterback, Northwestern  
Dropkicked record four field goals in one game, 1925 ... dropkicked 50-yard field goal, 1924 ... scored 27 points in one game, 1923

**Charles W. Bidwill, Sr.**, - 1933-1947 Chicago Cardinals  
Hall of Fame, 1967  
Owner/Administrator, Loyola-Chicago  
Built the famous "Dream Backfield" but died before it could bring him a Cardinals' championship ... purchased Cardinals' franchise in 1933.

**Marshall Goldberg** - 1939-1948 Chicago Cardinals  
Halfback/Defensive Back, Pittsburgh  
Earned second-team all-Pro notice in 1941 when, at midseason, led the league in rushing, punt and kickoff returns, and interceptions ... original member of Cards' "Dream Backfield" of Paul Chrisman, Pat Harder, Charley Trippi, Elmer Angsman and Goldberg.

## ARIZONA GAINS AN EDGE

On March 12, 2006, the Cardinals running game literally gained an Edge.

A four-time Pro Bowler and coming off back-to-back 1,500 yard seasons, Edgerrin James provides a boost to a Cardinals rushing attack that finished 32<sup>nd</sup> in the NFL in 2005.

In seven seasons with the Indianapolis Colts, James led the NFL in rushing twice (1999 & 2000) and finished in the top five among rushers four times.

James has rushed for over 1,200 yards in five of his seven NFL seasons. The last Cardinal running back to rush for 1,200 yards in a season was Ottis Anderson (1,270) in 1983.

## DOMINATING SINCE 1999

James was selected by the Colts with the fourth-overall pick in the 1999 NFL Draft, since that time, no other running back has gained as many yards on the ground as James.

Since entering the league, James has tallied 9,226 yards. The next closest back is the Jets' Curtis Martin, who in the time span gained 9,015 yards.

## ROWEN HEADS OFFENSIVE ATTACK

Entering his second season as the Cardinals offensive coordinator, Keith Rowen provides consistency for a Cardinals offense that has endured turnover in the position for years.

Rowen is the first offensive coordinator to hold the position for two consecutive years since 2002.

Under Rowen's guidance, the Cardinals offense ranked #1 in passing and 8<sup>th</sup> overall in 2005.

The Cardinals relied heavily on the pass (66.7% of total plays) in 2005. Quarterback Kurt Warner passed for five 300+ yard games and receivers Larry Fitzgerald and Anquan Boldin combined for 15 100-yard games, the most in franchise history.

With the addition of James, the Cardinals look to balance their offensive attack in 2006 and stay in the top 10 of the league.

## GAINING ON CAMPBELL

James needs 181 rushing yards to tie Earl Campbell and rank among the top 20 rushers of all time. Entering the 2006 season, James has recorded 9,226 rushing yards. Campbell finished his career with 9,407.

## WARNER ENTERS YEAR TWO

Entering his second season under center for the Arizona Cardinals is two-time NFL MVP quarterback Kurt Warner. Warner inked a three-year pact with the Cardinals on Valentine's Day, 2006 after signing a one-year deal for the 2005 season.

Warner fueled the Cards passing attack in 2005, recording the highest completion percentage in team history (64.5%) and led the Cards to the #1 ranked passing offense in the NFL for the first time in team history.

A nine year veteran of the NFL, Warner suffered a knee injury in the Cardinals game in Houston last season after starting the game by completing 10 of 10 passes. Warner missed the final two games of the season.

## WARNER STREAKS TO END '05

Before exiting the game at Houston on 12/18/05 with a knee injury, Warner had completed all 10 of his pass attempts for 115 yards with a 20-yard TD. At the end of the previous week's game vs. Washington, he connected on his last two and combined to complete his last 12 pass attempts, three shy of the team record.

The NFL record for consecutive passes is 24, set by Donovan McNabb over a two-game span in 2004.

## RACKERS GOING THE DISTANCE

Kicker Neil Rackers doesn't mind a long distance relationship at all. The NFL single-season field goal record holder nailed 6 of 7 field goals from beyond 50 yards in 2005 and since 2004 has hit 11 of 16 from beyond 50.

With 40 field goals in 2005 Rackers placed his name atop the all-time NFL record for field goals in a single season. Rackers tied the record with a 28-yarder early in the second quarter of the 2005 season finale at Indy and broke the record with a 42-yarder in the fourth quarter becoming the first player in NFL history to kick 40 field goals in a season.

Rackers went 10 straight games without missing a single field goal, connecting on 31 attempts to smash the previous club record of 11.

Rackers finished 2005 with the club record for field goal percentage (95.2), field goal attempts (42) and field goals made (40).

## CARDS DRAFT LEINART

With each of the first nine selections in the 2006 NFL Draft, it became more and more obvious that Heisman Trophy winner and two-time National Champion quarterback Matt Leinart was going to be available when the Cardinals selected at #10.

Leinart gives the Cards a long-term plan at quarterback while Leinart can gain valuable experience under a two-time MVP quarterback in Kurt Warner.

Leinart led USC to two National Championships while recording a 37-2 career record as a starter. His only two losses were by three points each, a triple-OT loss to Cal in 2003 and a last second loss to Texas in the Rose Bowl.

## ROOKIE FREE AGENTS

Sometimes the biggest surprise of camp comes from someone who wasn't even drafted. Here's a look at the Cards rookie free agents in 2006:

**WR Damarius Bilbo** - 6-2, 220-pounder from Georgia Tech ranked 13<sup>th</sup> in reception yards per game in the ACC as a senior.

**FS Chris Harrell** - Finished a Penn State career with 228 total tackles and 7.5 sacks and started every game his senior season.

**CB Darrell Hunter** - Miami (OH) graduate who finished his career with the RedHawks starting his last 38 games and recorded the fastest 40-yard dash time in school history.

**WR Greg Lee** - First team All-Big East receiver from the University of Pittsburgh led the conference in yards per game with an 87.5 average in his junior season in 2005.

**S Jay McCareins** - Led Division I-AA in interceptions (9), passes defended (20), interceptions for a touchdown (2) and interception return yards (236) for Princeton.

**LB Lawrence Pinson** - Started all but one game in 2005 as a senior at Oklahoma State, finished fifth on the team with 44 tackles and two sacks.

**DE A.J. Schable** - In his 39 career starts for the South Dakota Coyotes, recorded 145 career tackles (91 solo), 44.5 tackles for a loss, three forced fumbles, two blocked kicks and 28.0 quarterback sacks (school record 19 came in senior season).

**TE Alex Shor** - 6-7, 250-pounder from Syracuse University saw action in all 11 games his senior season.

**WR Micheal Spurlock** - Speedy wide receiver who played quarterback throughout his college career at the University of Mississippi before starting his final game at running back.

**CB Justin Wyatt** - Started all 26 games his junior and senior seasons at powerhouse USC while being a part of two National Championship teams.

## PENDERGAST GUIDES CARDINALS D

Clancy Pendergast planted seeds in the Cardinals defense when he was hired in 2004. Entering his third season with the team, Pendergast's defense is reaping the fruits of his labor.

It should come as no surprise that Pendergast had the foresight to see the Cardinals defense from seedling to crop. He was raised on a farm in Glendale, AZ where Cardinals Stadium now sits. The house he grew up in is still standing and his father continues to farm dairy and various crops on the land adjacent to the stadium.

Upon his arrival Pendergast instilled a sense of urgency in the Cardinals defense and built the unit on speed.

After the addition of Bertrand Berry in free agency, the Cards addressed the need for speed through the draft, picking up linebacker Karlos Dansby (2004), and cornerbacks Antrel Rolle and Eric Green (2005).

In his first season with Pendergast, Berry earned his first Pro Bowl appearance and led the NFC in sacks with 14.5 in 2004.

In 2005, Pendergast used safety Adrian Wilson in a variety of ways allowing him to record eight sacks, the most ever by a defensive back since sacks became an official statistic in 1982.

Prior to his arrival, the Cardinals allowed 344.0 yards per game. In two seasons under Pendergast, the Cards defense has allowed 308 yards per game on average.

Injuries depleted the Cardinals defensive line in 2005 and the team took note in both the draft and free agency. The team signed defensive tackle Kendrick Clancy in unrestricted free agency and drafted defensive tackles Gabe Watson and Jonathan Lewis in the fourth and sixth round, respectively.

The unit's rank has also risen since Pendergast took over. In 2003 the Cardinals had the 28<sup>th</sup> ranked defense in the league. In 2004 the rank rose to 12<sup>th</sup> and cracked the top 10 in 2005, finishing 8<sup>th</sup> overall.

## ON A ROLLE

After missing 11 games in 2005 with a knee injury, Antrel Rolle entered the Cardinals 2006 training camp fully recovered and he wants to let everyone know.

The Cardinals first round pick in 2005 (8<sup>th</sup> overall), Rolle was sidelined for the majority of 2005 following a meniscus tear in his knee. Rolle returned for two games at the tail end of 2005, only to have swelling in his knee sideline him again for the final two games of the year.

After minor surgery in the offseason to clean scar tissue in his knee, Rolle returned to training camp in Flagstaff this summer at 100%, just ask the Cardinals offense who he has been picking off at a rate of nearly once a day.

## CARDS IN TOP 10 ON BOTH SIDES OF BALL

The Cardinals finished 2005 ranked 8th in the NFL in both overall offense and overall defense. They were the only NFL team that finished in the top 10 in both. Since the 1970 merger, the Cardinals have finished in the top 10 in both overall offense and overall defense on just two other occasions. In 1984, they finished #8 in offense and #3 in defense while in 1970 they had the #3 offense and #10 defense.

The last time the Cardinals offense finished a season as high as eighth was 1993 (#8) and the last time the team's defense did so was 1994 (#3). In 2004, just three teams finished the regular season in the top 10 offensively and defensively, including both Super Bowl participants. The Broncos were 5<sup>th</sup> offensively and 4<sup>th</sup> defensively while the Patriots finished 7<sup>th</sup> and 9<sup>th</sup> and the Eagles were 9<sup>th</sup> and 10<sup>th</sup>.

## BERRY RETURNS

Cardinals defensive end Bertrand Berry is no stranger to adversity, or overcoming it.

Originally drafted by the Colts as a linebacker, Berry moved to defensive end early in his career. Following his stint with the Colts, Berry signed with the St. Louis Rams but didn't make it through training camp.

Berry then spent 2000 out of football. After a try out with the Denver Broncos on New Years Day 2001, Berry signed with the Broncos where he spent three seasons before signing with the Cardinals in 2004.

After recording an NFC high 14.5 sacks and being named to his first career Pro Bowl in 2004, Berry was on pace for another trip to Hawaii in 2005, recording six sacks in the first eight games before suffering a pectoral muscle injury vs. Seattle (11/6/05).

Berry spent the remainder of 2005 on the injured reserve but made a full recovery for the team's offseason conditioning program.

Returning to the field at full strength, Berry renews a defensive line that was battered by injuries in 2005. Defensive tackle Russell Davis was lost for the '05 season with a bicep injury while top reserve Calvin Pace was lost following an accident at his home during the bye week.

## STRENGTH OF SCHEDULE

The Cardinals enter the 2006 season with the 19<sup>th</sup> hardest schedule among the 32 teams in the NFL based on 2005 records.

The Cincinnati Bengals and New York Giants are tied for the hardest schedule. Their opponents went 139-117 (.543) in 2005.

The "easiest" schedule belongs to the Chicago Bears, whose opponents went 114-142 in 2005.

## YO, ADRIAN!

Adrian Wilson's 8.0 sacks in 2005 not only led the team, they were the most in the NFL by a DB since sacks became an official statistic in 1982. It also became the first time in Cardinals history a DB led the team in sacks.

Wilson, the team's leading tackler, recorded his second career 100-tackle season in 2005 with 112 tackles and was named an alternate to the Pro Bowl.

Wilson finished with 110 tackles in 2002 and 99 in 2004.

After the team placed DE Bertrand Berry on injured reserve, the team's sack leader until being injured, Wilson picked up the slack. In the seven games in that span, Wilson recorded 42 tackles, 6.0 sacks and an interception

## KEY PLAYERS RETURN FROM INJURY

Injuries may be a part of the game, but in 2005 no one would have expected the Cardinals would lead the league in players placed on injured reserve.

The Cards lost 15 players to injury in 2005, the most in the league. The NFL average was 7.9 players on injured reserve. The lowest in the league, the Pittsburgh Steelers lost only one player due to injury and went on to win Super Bowl XL.

Of the 15 players the Cards lost in 2005, at least seven figured to be full-time starters. Both lines were decimated with injuries. The defensive line lost starters Bertrand Berry and Russell Davis while the offensive line lost Alex Stepanovich and Reggie Wells.

The list of 15 players does not include DE Calvin Pace who was lost for the season after suffering lacerations on his arm in a household accident during the bye week.

## CARDS AND STEELERS TOGETHER IN HISTORY

Both the Cardinals and Steelers have a rich history in the National Football League. The Cardinals are the oldest continuously run professional football franchise and the Steelers are the fifth-oldest.

"The Rooney family and the Bidwill family have enjoyed a great relationship over almost 75 years of NFL football," said Steelers Chairman Dan Rooney. "That is why we're excited that the Steelers are coming to Arizona to play in the first game in the Cardinals beautiful new stadium and help kick off a new chapter of NFL football in the Phoenix area."

The patriarchs of both football families – Charles Bidwill and Art Rooney – are enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame. Currently both families have third generation leadership with Art Rooney II and Michael Bidwill following in the footsteps of their fathers Dan and Bill.

Because of the man-power shortage during World War II, the teams merged in 1944 to form Card-Pitt. Co-coached by the Cardinals' Phil Handler and the Steelers' Walt Kiesling, a former Cardinal guard, the team split its home games between Comiskey Park and Forbes Field.

Because of the unique history between the two teams, Michael Bidwill wanted the Rooneys and the Steelers to be part of the historic opening of the Cardinals new home in the West Valley.

"I started talking to the Rooneys last season," added Bidwill. "We are very excited about the historic opportunity in this cutting-edge stadium."

The preseason game will mark Pittsburgh's first visit to Arizona since 1997 when the Steelers earned a 26-20 overtime victory. Additionally, it will be just their fourth visit to Arizona to play the Cards (1988, '94 and '97). Also, the Steelers faced the Dallas Cowboys in Super Bowl XXX at Sun Devil Stadium following the 1995 season.

## GREEN AND COWHER IN 100-WIN CLUB

Dennis Green joined the group of head coaches with 100 or more wins in 2004 as he recorded his 100<sup>th</sup> regular season win at Miami. In 2006, the Cardinals will face 100-win coaches on five separate occasions.

## WOLFLYISMS ABOUND

As the Cardinals and Steelers meet this weekend, there are familiar faces on either side of the broadcast booth.

Cardinals color analyst Ron Wolfley is entering his second season in the booth, while his brother, Craig handles the sideline duties for Steelers radio.

According to Ron however, it's all about how high up you are in the stadium.

"I want to make this perfectly clear that you understand that he is the sideline reporter," said Ron. "I am the color analyst and he is the sideline reporter. Yes he's my older brother, yes he played longer in the NFL than I did, but he is the sideline reporter standing in corners whispering about what is going on down on the field while I'm up in the booth. Notice the elevation, I am in the booth and he is on the sideline. I think that pretty much says it all."

## FITZGERALD SETS NEW MARKS AT PITT

In just 26 career games with the Pittsburgh Panthers, Cardinals receiver Larry Fitzgerald caught 161 passes for 2,677 yards and 34 touchdowns. Only two other receivers caught more passes in their Pitt career than Fitzgerald, and Fitzgerald left after his sophomore year.

Fitzgerald's 34 touchdowns broke the school record of 0, previously set by Antonio Bryant. Fitzgerald also set a school record with at least one touchdown in 16 consecutive games and he became the only player in school history to post back-to-back 1,000 yard seasons.

## GAMES CAN BE SEEN ON NFL NETWORK

The NFL Network will broadcast this week's game live across the country. Next week's Cardinals game in New England can also be seen live on the NFL Network.

The NFL Network will broadcast 52 preseason games in 24 days in 2006. The network broadcasts every game except those shown nationally by the NFL's four network partners.

Next week's game is one of only two this preseason that the network will produce live. The network will also simulcast four games across the country, except in the competing team's markets.

During this week's simulcast, the network will use the Cardinals radio announcers as the play-by-play voice for the first half and then switch to the Steelers broadcasters for the second half.

The NFL Network will begin airing live NFL games this Thanksgiving.

## THE MEN IN BLACK (SHOES)

When the Cardinals signed Edgerrin James, not only did they acquire a new look in the backfield, but their shoes received a face lift as well.

James lobbied the Cardinals administration to switch to black shoes for their uniform. On the first day of mini camp James was presented with a gift wrapped shoe box containing a pair of black cleats.

"If you look good you feel good," said James. "And if you feel good, you play good. Now we're coordinated."

NFL teams must choose one primary color for their shoes, black or white. Since the mid-1970's the Cardinals had worn white cleats.

Including the Cardinals, 17 teams wear black shoes. Prior to this season only one other team in the NFC West wore black shoes, Seattle.

The change in shoe style comes one year after the Cardinals made dramatic changes to their uniform and revamped the Cardinal logo.

## SUPER BOWL CHAMPS AND THE PRESEASON

Both the Cardinals and the Steelers went 3-1 in the preseason in 2005. The Steelers went on to win Super Bowl XL, although success in the preseason isn't guaranteed to carry over into the regular season.
